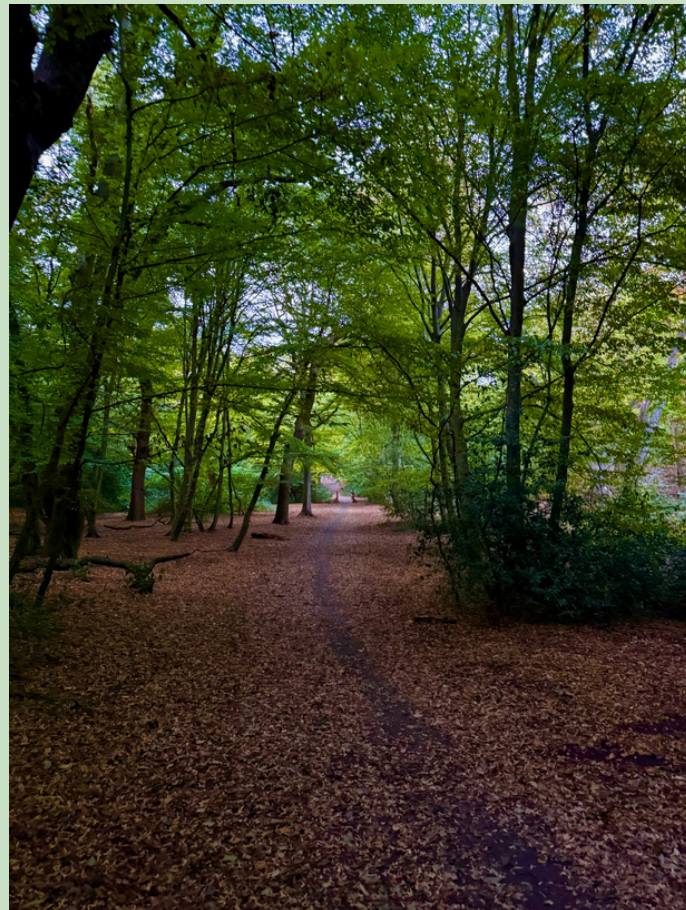

# TOP 3 TIPS FOR BETTER STAKEHOLDER MANAGEMENT

## 1. LEAD WITH CLARITY & CONSISTENCY
